As you'll read on the following pages, 2009 was a record year for us in many regards from surpassing over 500 loans made to leveraging over \$98 million in the Capital Region. This coming year, we do not plan to sit on our assets – rather, we plan to fully utilize the experience, networks and resources that have been built up for the last 25 years. The time is *now* to influence, finance and shape the future of our communities.

Thus far in 2010, the Community Loan Fund is working:

- to make another \$3 million in new loans to nonprofit organizations and small businesses right here in the Capital Region
- to launch a new and innovative Residential Mortgage Lending program with several key partners, including the Affordable Housing Partnership
- to expand our community development revitalization efforts by actively facilitating key initiatives that will be announced during the year
- to expand our training and technical assistance program to micro and social enterprises and build on existing relationships
- to expand our internal capacity by adding additional staff and investing in our operational systems
- and finally, to celebrate 25 years of building community assets all year long!

Twenty-five years of building community assets provides a wonderful base for real change, right now!

We share a similar belief with you that we can, and must, do better as a regional community and we hope to continue partnering with you as we strive to make the Capital Region a better place for all. Thank you for your ongoing efforts and support.

OUR PROGRAMS

Our 2009 Highlights

As you will see below, we continue to *align your money with your values*, investing in community safely and soundly. Here are a few highlights from activities in 2009:

- Made over \$2.7 million in community and economic development loans to 44 nonprofit groups and small businesses our most ever in one year
- Surpassed 500 cumulative loans, totaling close to \$24 million (and our cumulative loan loss rate remains under 2%)
- Increased our nonprofit loan limit up to \$500,000 and made the 1st loan of that size to Better Neighborhoods, Inc. to develop 10 affordable, green and universally accessible homes in Schenectady
- Based on our most recent three-year business plan, we were awarded a \$1 million
 - performance-based grant from the Department of Treasury CDFI Fund (we were one of 62 applicants approved out of 452 submissions)
- Invited by the Governor, we participated in a Small Business Task Force press conference at the State Capitol where we were able to highlight the work of the Community Loan Fund; we also received increased support from NYS Empire State Development Corp. for our micro enterprise and small business programs
- Counseled and trained over 350 micro and social entrepreneurs



Our Programs

Community Economic Development Lending

- Loans up to \$500,000 for nonprofit community development organizations that provide affordable housing, services to low-income or disadvantaged people, or help revitalize their communities
- Loans to small businesses and micro enterprises owned by women, minorities or low-income people; loans up to \$10,000 for start-up businesses and up to \$35,000 for expansion of existing businesses
- Participation loans with many area banks and credit unions are available to both nonprofits
 and small businesses for projects that exceed our loan limits. The Community Loan Fund
 can help package appropriate financing.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Board of Directors Capital District Community Loan Fund, Inc. Albany, New York

We have audited the accompanying statements of financial position of the Capital District Community Loan Fund, Inc. (a nonprofit corporation) as of December 31, 2009 and 2008 and the related statements of activities and changes in net assets and cash flows for the years then ended. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Community Loan Fund's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audits.

We conducted our audits in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audits provide a reasonable basis for our opinion.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Capital District Community Loan Fund, Inc. as of December 31, 2009 and 2008, and the changes in its net assets and cash flows for the years then ended, in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

In accordance with Government Auditing Standards, we have also issued our report dated February 23, 2010, on our consideration of the Capital District Community Loan Fund, Inc.'s internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with Government Auditing Standards and should be considered in assessing the results of our audit.

Training and Technical Assistance

- Business Planning Training: Courses held throughout the year in partnership with The School of Business at the College of Saint Rose
- Technical Assistance provided to nonprofits and small businesses with one-on-one consulting, special workshops, networking and referrals
- Matched Savings Program offered to low-income households starting or expanding a business. Participants receive financial education training and, upon completion of a business plan, participants' own savings can be matched with a grant.
- Center for Micro Enterprise Development: a strategic alliance with The College of Saint Rose and the Albany Center for Economic Success to meet the developmental needs of micro entrepreneurs

Socially Concerned Investing

- The Community Loan Fund provides an opportunity for concerned individuals and institutions to put their principles into practice and invest locally in community improvements. Socially concerned investors loan or donate to the Community Loan Fund thereby providing the necessary capital for our community and economic development activities.
- Loan amounts range from \$1,000 to \$500,000 and terms from one year to twenty years.
- The Community Loan Fund's growing number of investors over 300 individuals, faith-based institutions, unions, foundations, banks, and other business and civic groups have enjoyed a 100% repayment rate.






