

Multiplier effect

WHEN MONEY SPENT MULTIPLIES AS IT FILTERS THROUGH THE ECONOMY

In the world of Community Development Financial Institutions (CDFIs), the multiplier effect is evidenced in many ways, from leveraging, to synergy, to social capital. 2017 was a high-impact year for the Community Loan Fund of the Capital Region (CLFCR) and the many economic development projects we supported and financed – each of which leveraged additional dollars or created synergy, sending positive ripples throughout the communities in which they were based.

LEVERAGING

Every dollar invested in community-based economic development projects leverages money from private investors, banks and/or government programs. In 2017, CLFCR loaned \$5.7 million which leveraged an additional \$27.3 million. Each dollar leveraged an additional \$4.79. Throughout CLFCR's 33 year history, each dollar financed by CLFCR has directly leveraged an additional \$3.76.

SYNERGY

Because much of CLFCR's work is community-based, there is also a synergistic effect that is evidenced by borrowers working together to meet each other's needs and to create stronger, thriving communities.

in 2017, Jenn Dugan of The Make-Up Curlo began working with CLFCR staff to plan a physical location for her business, a dream that she had been working on since 2015. On Friday, October 13 (the date was NOT a coincidence), Jenn officially cut the ribbon to her beautiful new retail and service shop at 510 State Street in downtown Schenectady. The Make-Up Curlo blends the beautiful and the unusual, with skincare and transformation services in beauty, theater and special effects.



Simultaneously, across the street, **Prince Sprauve** of **Told By Us (TBU) Productions** began working with CLFCR staff. TBU
Productions is a nonprofit organization that works to strengthen
communities through the production of music and films that
explore social issues from the perspective of teens age 13 to
20 from Schenectady City Schools. In 2013, TBU Productions'
first full-length feature film, Fast Life, was unveiled. It depicted
"the circumstances that attract teens to a life of violent crime,
from the perspective of the students themselves." Prince
wanted to continue producing movies with the students. To do
so, he needed money for cash flow to create and promote the
film, as well as additional technical equipment to enhance the

nonprofit's audio and visual production capabilities. After securing the necessary financing, TBU Productions went to work on Cradle, its newest film that is addressing the alarmingly high rates of teen pregnancy in Schenectady.

Prince hired Jenn to do the special effects make-up for Cradle; because of her background in film, she soon became Cradle's production manager.



SOCIAL CAPITAL

Since 1989, CLFCR has been financing affordable housing projects for the Albany Community Land Trust (ACLT). In total, CLFCR has loaned ACLT \$2.275 million, which has leveraged an additional \$2.262 million from other sources. ACLT has created or rehabbed 73 affordable housing units for low-income residents and families in Albany.

In 2015, John Walker created Kingdom Services Unlimited, LLC. KSU's main line of business is property management (snow removal, lawn mowing and property cleanouts), building board-ups and other services. Soon after creating KSU, John began contracting with ACLT to take care of their properties and buildings. In 2017, he expanded the business. John graduated from CLFCR's 8-week business class, began the process to become MBE certified, and secured financing through CLFCR for additional equipment. With the added capacity, John is able to take on bigger jobs and be of more service to the nonprofit organizations in the community that are working to renovate and rehab vacant buildings and properties. He

has 6 part-time employees to whom he teaches the basics of property management, as well as the life skills necessary for them to be successful. John now contracts with the Albany County Land Bank and Habitat for Humanity Capital District.

Whether it's leveraging additional dollars, creating synergy, or building social capital, community-development projects assisted and financed by CLFCR are so much more important than the amount loaned or the number of jobs initially created. These projects are spearheaded by people who have a vision of and a commitment to a thriving, vibrant Capital Region. Because of CLFCR's model of affordable loan products coupled with training and technical assistance, the projects are coming to fruition. Together, we truly are strengthening communities and changing lives.



THINKING OUTSIDE THE PORTFOLIO


At the end of 2016, CLFCR launched an "Invest Locally" Campaign to raise additional lending capital. The main source of capital for our revolving loan fund is from socially concerned individuals, organizations and businesses - known as investors - who lend us the money. The money is still theirs; they're just letting us use it, and earning interest while we do. The funds are then pooled and loaned to high-impact community development projects throughout the Capital Region. CLFCR staff work with the businesses and nonprofit organizations that are spearheading these projects to ensure that the projects are mission appropriate and financially viable; and that the individuals involved have the necessary expertise and support to be successful.



IN 2017, CLFCR FINANCED OUR LARGEST POOL OF LOANS TO DATE: *5.7 MILLION, LEVERAGING AN ADDITIONAL *27.3 MILLION FROM OTHER SOURCES.

Those community development projects renovated buildings, engaged high-risk teens, expanded a day-care center, and launched a teen clothing designer...just to name a few.

In late 2016, CLFCR was awarded a \$20,000 grant from the AARP Foundation for "Work for Yourself@50+", an initiative designed to assist low- and moderate-income adults age 50+ to understand the pros and cons of self-employment and to support them through the early steps of business development.

Using the AARP Foundation model, Paul Stewart, Director of Training and Technical Assistance, and Johan Matthews, Training and Technical Assistance Associate, have conducted 10 workshops throughout Albany, Schenectady and Troy, reaching 90 individuals interested in learning more about starting a business.

GET A LYFE!

The Leveraging Youth For Entrepreneurship (LYFE) program is a month-long intensive entrepreneurship course created by the Community Loan Fund of the Capital Region (CLFCR) in partnership with the City of Albany's LIGHT (Learning, Initiative and Gaining Headway Together) Summer Youth Employment Program.

Albany High School has a total enrollment of 2,410 with a graduation rate of 59%. Minority enrollment is 79%, and 66% of the students are economically disadvantaged.

Entrepreneurship can be a path to economic self-sufficiency for some Capital Region youth, especially those who focus on a specific trade or skill versus attending college. The LYFE Program provides participating students with the tools, resources and expertise necessary to map out that path.

Launched in 2016, the LYFE program runs each July. During the four-week program, students from Albany summer youth are challenged to develop a business idea and to create a business plan. Each week is devoted to a specific aspect of developing an enterprise such as: Leadership & Entrepreneurship, Marketing & Branding, Finance and Banking. Each session is a combination of informative presentations, interactive ideagenerating sessions, hands-on activities, research, guest speakers and one-on-one assistance from CLFCR staff and entrepreneurs/experts. At the end of the program, each student presents his/her business plan to a panel of judges.

Judges from 2017 included: Albarry Commissioner of Recreation, Youth and Workforce Services Jonathan P. Jones and CLFCR Staff Willow Olson and Destiny Watkins. The winner of the 2017 presentations was Esmeralda Jones, who created a business plan for an archeological artifact auction house.

- Warren County SPCA (Warren): \$20,000 revolving line of credit to support operations while awaiting reimbursement from contracts.
- Eastern Door Counseling Center, Inc. (Rensselaer): \$22,000 loan to a start-up mental health care center.
- AIM Services, Inc. (Warren): \$216,000 term loan to purchase and renovate a home for people with disabilities.
- Community Land Trust of Schenectady, Inc. (Schenectady): \$55,000 term loan to renovate housing that will be sold to a family of low-to-moderate income.
- Community Land Trust of Schenectady, Inc. (Schenectady): \$30,000 loan for repairs to its administrative offices.
- Habitat for Humanity of Northern Saratoga, Warren and Washington Counties, Inc. (Saratoga/Warren/Washington): \$445,600 loan to purchase and renovate a commercial property that will become administrative offices and a Habitat ReStore.

- program also serves as a platform for the exchange of ideas and resources among participants and the community.
- Victorious Life Christian Church (Rensselaer): \$205,000 term loan to finance repairs on an historic building, circa 1863.
- Habitat for Humanity Capital District, Inc. (Albany): \$345,000 loan to make leasehold improvements and to purchase furniture and fixtures for its new office while awaiting reimbursement from an approved grant.



- Albany Symphony Orchestra, Inc. (Albany): \$469,775 loan to support ASO's highly-acclaimed Water Music NY program while ASO awaits receipt of approved grant funds.
- Hudson River Music Hall Productions, Inc. (Washington): \$75,000
 loan to purchase a Steinway Concert Grand Plano and assorted sound system equipment for The Strand Theatre in Hudson Falls.
- The Phoenix Project of Eastern New York, Inc. (Columbia): \$35,000 loan to renovate an historic abandoned and blighted building, circa 1880, that will then be sold as a commercial property. This advances PPENY's mission to preserve and restore historic buildings that otherwise would have been demolished or remain blighted.
- Battenkill Community Services, Inc. (Washington): \$130,000 loan to purchase and modify two passenger vans to transport clients.
- Second Chance Opportunities, Inc. (Albany): \$90,000 revolving line of credit for operations while awaiting reimbursement from approved NYS contracts. Founded in 2001, Second Chance Opportunities' mission is to provide support and services to people recovering from substance use disorders and their family members.

- Refugee Welcome Corp. (Albany): \$375,000 loan to support the renovation of property to be used to house refugees. Founded in 2011, RWC provides affordable rental space and personalized supportive service to help refugees transition to life in America.
- Cohoes II Limited Partnership, The Community Builders (Albany): \$500,000 loan for predevelopment work to create 80 units of mixed-income housing in the City of Cohoes.



- AIM Services, Inc. (Saratoga): \$500,000 line of credit for operations
 while AIM fulfills a contract with New York State for the nonprofit's
 Self-Direction Program. AIM Services, Inc. provides an array of
 supports and services to individuals with developmental disabilities
 and traumatic brain injuries, as well as to seniors looking to remain
 independent in their homes.
- Battenkill Culinary Services, Inc. (Washington): \$20,000 line of credit to start its culinary program. Battenkill Culinary Services is a social-enterprise project of Battenkill Community Services, a nonprofit serving individuals with developmental disabilities.
- South End Improvement Corporation (Albany): \$200,000 line of credit to purchase and renovate properties to be resold to individuals of moderate to low-income.
- Hubbard Hall Projects, Inc. (Washington): \$45,000 loan for building improvements to Hubbard Hall Opera House.
- Revolution Studios, Inc. (Schenectady): \$55,000 loan to purchase technical equipment to enhance and expand the nonprofit's audio

and visual production capabilities. This organization works with at-risk teens. By fostering the teens' creativity, it opens doors for future career opportunities.

- Community Land Trust of Schenectady, Inc. (Schenectady): \$300,000 revolving line of credit to allow the organization to make repairs, correct code violations and make safety and energy efficiency improvements to homes owned by seniors and individuals of low-income while awaiting grant reimbursement.
- Albany Community Land Trust (Albany): \$63,000 term loan to purchase a mixed-use building which will be improved and leased to individuals/ a family of low to moderate-income.
- Hudson River Music Hall Productions, Inc. (Washington): \$130,000 line of credit to install new HVAC system, expand stage & balcony, etc. to the historic Strand Theatre while awaiting income from grants and fundraising.
- Rural Migrant Ministry, Inc. (Dutchess): \$26,000 loan to purchase a vehicle to be used to transport clients and staff.
- Saratoga City Ballet, Inc. (Saratoga): \$15,000 revolving line of credit to support payroll & operations.
- St Paul's Center, Inc. (Rensselder): \$192,300 loan to purchase a building which will be renovated and used to provide supportive housing to women and their children.
- Joyful Beginnings Early Education Program, Inc. (Saratoga): \$15,000 revolving line of credit to support operations while the daycare awaits payments from the Department of Social Services. The organization is a nonprofit day care provider; 80% of the families that they serve are low-income.

SMALL BUSINESS LOANS

- Skit and Kaboodle, LLC (Schenectady): \$20,000 loan to a start-up woman-owned child enrichment business. Lindsay Walling created Skit and Kaboodle in 2015 and used loan proceeds to open a program in ViaPort Rotterdam.
- Buffalo Concrete Design (Columbia): \$10,000 loan to purchase equipment and materials to start a woman-owned boutique-style pre-cast concrete business. Teagan Joy Cook, owner of Buffalo Concrete Designs, creates traditional and custom decorative designs for residential and commercial use.



- JAFJR Construction Services, Inc. (Albany): \$100,000 line of credit to a NYS Certified MBE to purchase materials and to support operations while the borrower completes approved construction contracts. JAFJR offers comprehensive services to large prime contractors, including: painting, sheet rocking, taping, ceiling repair and replacement, and debris removal.
- Ebenezer Hair Salon Corporation (Albany): \$50,000 loan to a woman /minority-owned salon to purchase the building it currently leases.
- Kingdom Services Unlimited, LLC (Albany): \$30,500 loan to an existing minority-owned business to purchase equipment. Kingdom Services is a 10-year old property maintenance business; services include commercial cleaning, snow removal, lawn mowing, property cleanouts, and building board-ups.





- Head of State (Albany): \$25,000 loan to a minority-owned fashion business to purchase materials and inventory. Taofeek Abijako, owner of Head of State, has been featured in the New York Times and the Los Angeles Times, and has participated in fashion shows in New York and Paris.
- Memory Lane Day Care, LLC (Montgomery): \$50,000 loan to an expanding woman-owned daycare business for the purchase of equipment and to make leasehold improvements. Operating for six years, this expansion will allow daycare for up to 40 children in Amsterdam.
- The Makeup Curlo (Schenectady): \$7,500 loan to a woman-owned business to expand into a retail location.
- Dance Fire Studio and Fitness, LLC (Schenectady): \$13,000 loan to open a start-up woman-owned dance and fitness studio.



- All Mighty General Contracting (Albany): \$300,000 loan to purchase the vacant Freihofer's building in Arbor Hill, a low income census tract, which will then be renovated into commercial space.
- Colled, A Textured Salon (Schenectady): \$25,000 loan to expand a minority, woman-owned natural hair salon.
- ABunchABrunch (Schenectady): \$16,000 term loan to a start-up woman-owned restaurant.




